



DANBURY, CT AREA INFORMATION

<u>Danbury</u> is a city in Fairfield County, Connecticut, located along the Still River approximately 70 miles northeast of New York City. Its population is around 85,000, and it is within the New York Combined Statistical Area and the Bridgeport Metropolitan Area. The city is named for Danbury, England, the place of origin of many of its early settlers. It is nicknamed the "Hat City" because of its prominent history in the hat industry; for a period in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, it was the center of the American hat industry. The mineral danburite is named for Danbury. The community of Danbury is known as an excellent place to start a business and a great community that is committed to preserving a high quality of life and strives to encourage creativity, diversity, and innovation.


<u>Area Vibes Score</u> – Danbury scores a 72 livability rating, with strengths in amenities and low crime rates.

Transportation

While Danbury does offer public transportation via trains and buses, the majority of residents use a car as their main form of transportation. Interstate 84 and U.S. Route 7 are the main highways in the city. I-84 runs west to east from the lower Hudson Valley region of New York to Waterbury and Hartford. US 7 runs south to north from Norwalk (connecting to I-95) to the Litchfield Hills region. The two highways overlap in the downtown area.

Danbury is the terminus of the Danbury branch line of the <u>MTA Metro-North Railroad</u> which begins in Norwalk, where transfers to New York City are available. Local bus service is provided by the <u>Housatonic</u> <u>Area Regional Transit</u> (HART). The city is also the location of the <u>Danbury Municipal Airport</u>.

Schools

Generally, to register your child for school you will need to have a passport and/or birth certificate, proof of immunizations, any applicable past school records and proof of residency. Most public schools have boundary areas, and you must show proof (i.e. copy of lease or home purchase agreement) to be allowed to register in that particular school. Please always confirm requirements with the school you are interested in before assuming that your child will be able to attend that school.

Grade level in the public school system is determined by the age of the child. Typically, the child must be 5 years old by September 1st to enter kindergarten. School districts may be very strict about the age requirement, but inquire with the school district you are interested in to determine if there are any exemptions for foreign students who are ahead in grade level. You may also want to ask about any gifted or advanced programs as well as their English as a Second Language (ESL) Programs. Some elementary schools also offer a pre-Kindergarten program for children who miss the September 1st requirement. You may inquire at the school districts for availability.

Registration

Obtaining a Driver's License

In the US, a driver's license or ID card is issued by each individual state and not by the federal government. Since there is no national identity card in the USA, and many Americans don't have a passport or carry around a birth certificate, a driver's license issued by your state is often the only official piece of identification for many citizens. Since 9/11, you will need to show a valid driver's license or State ID card to enter many big office buildings.

If you have an out-of-state or out-of-country license, you may use it for as long as you maintain your residency in the state where it was issued. If you are moving permanently to Connecticut, you may use your out-of-state license for only your first month here. To change to a Connecticut license, bring your Social Security card, another form of ID, and multiple utility or phone bills verifying that you are a Connecticut resident to a motor vehicle facility. You'll have to pass written and eye exams, and usually a road test.
