



Madison, the capital and second largest city in Wisconsin, lies west of Milwaukee. It's known for the domed Wisconsin State Capitol, which sits on an isthmus between lakes Mendota and Monona. Since the 1960s, Madison has been a center of political liberalism, influenced in part by the presence of the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

The city's paved Capital City State Trail runs past Monona Terrace, a lakefront convention center designed by Frank Lloyd Wright. The main downtown thoroughfare is State Street, which links the University of Wisconsin campus with the Capitol Square, and is lined with restaurants, espresso cafes, and shops.

Transportation

Driving and Parking

A car is practically a necessity for regular travel outside the city center. More than 5,000 City public <u>parking</u> spaces are downtown, including 1,300 on-street metered spaces. 4,000 more spaces are available in other lots and garages.

Bus

<u>Madison Metro Transit</u> operates a bus service throughout the city of Madison and the surrounding communities of Middleton, Fitchburg, and Verona. It's easy to ride using a mobile device, planning your trip at home or on the bus. While traveling, get real time bus arrival information for your individual stop.

Bike

Bike Your Commute! <u>Commuting by bike</u> is often the quickest and most efficient mode of travel for trips of five miles or less. Biking to and from work or school is not only a healthy way to get exercise, but also a great way to save gas money and wear and tear on your car!

Airport

Dane County Regional Airport (airport code MSN) offers more than 95 daily arrivals and departures.

Schools

Generally, to register your child for school you will need to have a passport and/or birth certificate, proof of immunizations, any applicable past school records and proof of residency. Most public schools have boundary areas, and you must show proof (i.e. copy of lease or home purchase agreement) to be allowed to register in that particular school. Please always confirm requirements with the school you are interested in before assuming that your child will be able to attend that school.

Grade level in the public school system is determined by the age of the child. Typically, the child must be 5 years old by September 1st to enter kindergarten. School districts may be very strict about the age requirement, but inquire with the school district you are interested in to determine if there are any exemptions for foreign students who are ahead in grade level. You may also want to ask about any gifted or advanced programs as well as their English as a Second Language (ESL) Programs. Some elementary schools also offer a pre-Kindergarten program for children who miss the September 1st requirement. You may inquire at the school districts for availability.

Registration

Obtaining a Driver's License

In the US, a driver's license or ID card is issued by each individual state and not by the federal government. Since there is no national identity card in the USA, and many Americans don't have a passport or carry around a birth certificate, a driver's license issued by your state is often the only official piece of identification for many citizens. Since 9/11, you will need to show a valid driver's license or State ID card to enter many big office buildings.

A new resident must apply for a Wisconsin license in person at any driver license office to continue to drive legally. When applying for the new Wisconsin license the individual must surrender any unexpired driver license in their possession from another U.S. state, U.S. territory or a Canadian province.
