

Transportation

By Car

It is easy to drive and park around Chattanooga. Centrally located in the southeast, three major highways serve the city (I-75, I-24 and I-59). Whether you drive yourself or let someone else take the wheel via <u>Uber</u> or <u>Lyft</u>, all of Chattanooga's attractions are accessible by car.



By Bus and Trolley

Ditching your car is just as easy in Chattanooga. The Chattanooga Area Regional Transportation Authority (CARTA) is the public transit system. Not only does CARTA take you in and around the city, it also operates the Lookout Mountain Incline Railway. Along with the bus and incline railway, CARTA has a shuttle system that takes you to and from the downtown parking garages. For information on routes and schedules, click here.



By Bike

Biking in Chattanooga is a great way to take in its beautiful nature, network of <u>trails</u> and pedestrian bridges. CARTA is in cooperation with the city's bicycle network. Chattanooga has the first bike share system in the South and has 300 bikes at 30 different locations.

By Air

<u>Chattanooga Airport</u> is 10 miles away from downtown and offers direct and one stop flights to most domestic destinations.

Schools

Generally, to register your child for school you will need to have a passport and/or birth certificate, proof of immunizations, any applicable past school records and proof of residency. Most public schools have boundary areas, and you must show proof (i.e. copy of lease or home purchase agreement) to be allowed to register in that particular school. Please always confirm requirements with the school you are interested in before assuming that your child will be able to attend that school.

Grade level in the public school system is determined by the age of the child. Typically, the child must be 5 years old by September 1st to enter kindergarten. School districts may be very strict about the age requirement, but inquire with the school district you are interested in to determine if there are any exemptions for foreign students who are ahead in grade level. You may also want to ask about any gifted or advanced programs as well as their English as a Second Language (ESL) Programs. Some elementary schools also offer a pre-Kindergarten program for children who miss the September 1st requirement. You may inquire at the school districts for availability.

Registration

Obtaining a Driver's License

In the US, a driver's license or ID card is issued by each individual state and not by the federal government. Since there is no national identity card in the USA, and many Americans don't have a passport or carry around a birth certificate, a driver's license issued by your state is often the only official piece of identification for many citizens. Since 9/11, you will need to show a valid driver's license or State ID card to enter many big office buildings.

If you have an out-of-state or out-of-country license, you may use it for as long as you maintain your residency in the state where it was issued. If you are moving permanently to Tennessee, you may use your out-of-state license for only your first 30 days. You must turn in any driver license or permit from another state or country if you have one.

To change to a Tennessee license, you can start the application <u>online</u>, and then visit a Driver's Service Center with the following documents:

- Proof of U.S. Citizenship, Lawful Permanent Resident Status or Temporary Legal Presence documents.
- Proof of Tennessee Residency.
- Proof of SSN if one has been issued.
- Current State License/ID, with proof of name change if required.
- A completed Application for a Tennessee Driver License.
