Schools

Generally, to register your child for school you will need to have a passport and/or birth certificate, proof of immunizations, any applicable past school records and proof of residency. Most public schools have boundary areas, and you must show proof (i.e. copy of lease or home purchase agreement) to be allowed to register in that particular school. Please always confirm requirements with the school you are interested in before assuming that your child will be able to attend that school.

Grade level in the US public-school system is determined by the age of the child. School districts are usually very strict about the age requirement, but inquire with the school district you are interested in to determine if there are any exemptions for foreign students who are ahead in grade level. You may also want to ask about any gifted or advanced programs as well as their English as a Second Language (ESL) Programs. Some elementary schools also offer a pre-Kindergarten program for children who miss the deadline requirement. You may inquire at the school districts for availability, and contact your IOR Destination Services Consultant for more assistance with schooling questions.

Public Schools in New Jersey

<u>New Jersey's Interdistrict Public School Choice Program</u> enables approved choice districts to enroll K-12th grade students who do not reside within their districts without cost to their parents. The program increases educational opportunities for students and their families by providing students with school options outside of their district of residence and giving parents the power to select a school program that best serves their child's individual needs.

District participation in the program is optional, but requires application to the Department of Education. Once approved, the choice district designates the available seats in specific grades and programs that are open to choice students. Where choice options are available, any student who resides in New Jersey is eligible to apply.

<u>Hoboken Public School District</u> serves students in pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade. <u>Jersey City Public School District</u> serves students in pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade.

Private Schools

There are 8 <u>private schools in Hoboken</u> serving 1,874 students. A few include <u>The Hudson School</u>, <u>All</u> <u>Saints Day School</u>, and the <u>Hoboken Montessori School</u>.

There are 30 private schools in Jersey City serving 6,026 students. A few include <u>The French American</u> <u>Academy</u>, <u>Waterfront Montessori</u>, and <u>Stevens Cooperative School</u>.

The Archdiocese of Newark serves Hoboken and Jersey City with an array of Catholic Schools.

Registration

Obtaining a Driver's License

If you are moving permanently to New Jersey, you may use your out-of-state license for only your first 60 days here. To change to an New Jersey license, bring your Social Security card, another form of ID, and two utility or phone bills verifying that you are an New Jersey resident, and a fee to a motor vehicle facility. You'll have to pass written and eye exams, and usually a road test.
