Public Transportation

The <u>Wave Transit System</u> is the operator of public transportation in Mobile, operated by the City. Eleven local routes service the city and suburban regions, while the <u>trolley</u> provides downtown shuttle service.

By Air

Schools

Generally, to register your child for school you will need to have a passport and/or birth certificate, proof of immunizations, any applicable past school records and proof of residency. Most public schools have boundary areas, and you must show proof (i.e. copy of lease or home purchase agreement) to be allowed to register in that particular school. Please always confirm requirements with the school you are interested in before assuming that your child will be able to attend that school.

Grade level in the US public-school system is determined by the age of the child. School districts are usually very strict about the age requirement, but inquire with the school district you are interested in to determine if there are any exemptions for foreign students who are ahead in grade level. You may also want to ask about any gifted or advanced programs as well as their English as a Second Language (ESL) Programs. Some elementary schools also offer a pre-Kindergarten program for children who miss the deadline requirement. You may inquire at the school districts for availability, and contact your IOR Destination Services Consultant for more assistance with schooling questions.

Public Schools

Public schools in Mobile are operated by the <u>Mobile County Public School System</u>, which include <u>magnet</u> <u>schools</u> with focused themes and aligned curricula in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM), Fine and Performing Arts, and <u>International Baccalaureate</u>.

Private Schools

There are 49 <u>private schools</u> in Mobile, Alabama, serving 16,839 students. Many belong to the <u>Roman</u> <u>Catholic Archdiocese of Mobile</u>. Other private school options include <u>St. Paul's Episcopal School</u>, <u>Mobile</u> <u>Christian School</u>, <u>St. Lukes Episcopal School</u>, and <u>UMS-Wright Preparatory School</u>.

Registration

Obtaining a Driver's License

In the US, a driver's license or ID card is issued by each individual state and not by the federal government. Since there is no national identity card in the USA, and many Americans don't have a passport or carry around a birth certificate, a driver's license issued by your state is often the only official piece of identification for many citizens. Since 9/11, you will need to show a valid driver's license or State ID card to enter many big office buildings.

If you have an out-of-state or out-of-country license, you may use it for as long as you maintain your residency in the state where it was issued. International licenses are not recognized in Alabama. If you are moving permanently to Alabama, you may use your out-of-state license for only your first 30 days.

To change to an Alabama license, bring your Social Security card, another form of ID, and two utility or phone bills verifying that you are an Alabama resident to a motor vehicle facility. You'll have to pass written and eye exams, and usually a road test.
