the student will be able to practice pronouncing/practicing difficult words

No preparation needed

Always keep track of words the students are having trouble pronouncing. This does not have to be a one-time activity, as you could use this as often as every week (when the student is a beginner and finds pronunciation challenging) or at least once a month for higher level students. Make sentence strips using the words that the student finds hard to pronounce. Ask your student to pronounce these difficult-to-pronounce sentences and correct/explain as needed. Keep the strips and use them in each lesson; this is a great activity for a quick lesson wrap-up. You can remove a sentence strip when you feel the student has learned the pronunciation of the difficult word which can be very motivating!



For example, if students have trouble pronouncing the words *responsibility, prioritize, comfortable, educate,* and *extremely,* the teacher might make the following sentence strips:

- 1. This office chair is extremely comfortable.
- 2. We need to educate people on how to prioritize their responsibilities.
