



Guidelines for Language Teacher Bios

At IOR we love to showcase our teachers' professional language teaching experience and talents. To help achieve that goal, we ask you to create a short biography that we would share with your participants when they begin their program. It gives your students an opportunity to get to know you and feel more comfortable with you before their program begins.

The following list includes some guidelines to follow as you write your bio. Please feel free to update your bio any time it changes.

- Please keep the bio to 1-2 paragraphs.
- The voice should be in 3rd person. Be sure to start out the bio with your title and name (Dr., Ms., Mr., Rev.). Providing a title will help students know how to address you if they would like to address you formally.
- List the length of your teaching experience and in what languages. Many language trainers also like to list what kinds of students (children and/or adult) they've taught and from which countries/continents.
- Be sure to list any professional/academic/educational credentials (degrees, certificates). You can also include any professional memberships you have.
- List any other professional work experience you have in the language (translator, interpreter, international work).
- Mention why you like teaching and why you continue to do it.
- Mention any other relevant interests.
- If you have a photo, you can also include that.
