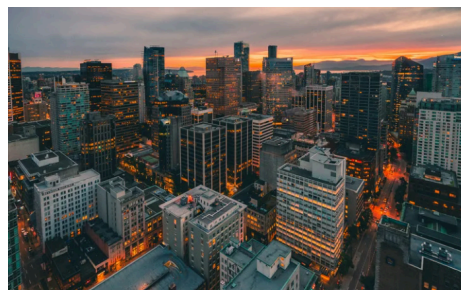


### For Singles & Young Professionals

Urban, walkable, transit-friendly, close to dining and nightlife

Typical Neighborhoods:

- **Yaletown:** Converted warehouses, modern condos, top-tier restaurants, and



- Seawall access. It's social, stylish, and very "after-work plans just happened."
- **Mount Pleasant:** Creative, casual, and brewery-heavy. Murals, Main Street energy, and a strong community feel without trying too hard.
- **Gastown:** Historic buildings, indie boutiques, and some of the city's best cocktail bars. Artsy, urban, and full of character.
- **Lower Lonsdale (North Vancouver):** Waterfront living with breweries, food halls, and a quick SeaBus ride downtown.

## Rental Trends:

- **1-Bedroom:** approx. CAD \$2,400–\$3,000/month
- **2-Bedroom:** approx. CAD \$3,200–\$4,000/month

### What You're Paying For:

Proximity to downtown, SkyTrain or SeaBus access, newer condos or character lofts, and an active social scene. Mount Pleasant and Lower Lonsdale tend to offer slightly better value than Yaletown or the downtown core while delivering the same lifestyle perks in a slightly more laid-back setting.



## For Family and Space-Seekers

Quieter streets, good schools, parks, and more room to spread out.

### Typical Neighborhoods:

- **Kitsilano:** Beach-adjacent living with excellent schools, walkable shopping streets, and a laid-back, family-friendly vibe that still feels very Vancouver.
- **Point Grey:** Prestigious and peaceful, with strong public and private schools, proximity to beaches and the University of British Columbia, and classic West Side charm.
- **Dunbar:** Leafy residential streets, a strong sense of community, and easy access to Pacific Spirit Park. Popular with families prioritizing schools and stability.
- **Lynn Valley (North Vancouver):** Trailheads, forests, and a true neighborhood feel. Ideal for outdoors-focused families who still want access to the city.

## Rental Trends:

- **2-Bedroom:** approx. CAD \$3,000–\$3,800/month
- **3-Bedroom+:** approx. CAD \$3,800–\$4,800+/month

### What You're Paying For:

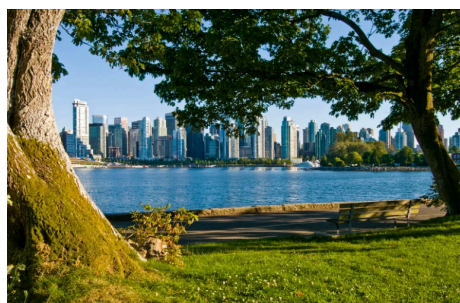
Larger units, quieter neighborhoods, access to strong schools, and proximity to parks and outdoor space. Crossing into Burnaby or the North Shore often delivers better value per square foot while maintaining excellent transit and family amenities.

## Value-Oriented Urban Living

Still close to the city, slightly less buzz, better value

### Typical Neighborhoods:

- **East Vancouver (select pockets):** Residential streets with strong



- community feel, local restaurants, and solid transit connections. Less nightlife, more livability.
- **South Vancouver:** A mix of older homes and newer low-rise developments, offering more space at lower price points while staying well-connected by transit.
- **Edmonds/Highgate areas of Burnaby:** Diverse, family-friendly areas with parks, community centers, and noticeably more affordable rents compared to Vancouver proper.
- **Metrotown/ Brentwood areas of Burnaby:** High-rise living near one of the region's largest shopping hubs, with excellent SkyTrain access and competitive pricing for newer units.

## Rental Trends:

- **1-Bedroom:** approx. CAD \$2,200–\$2,700/month
- **2-Bedroom:** approx. CAD \$2,800–\$3,400/month

### What You're Paying For:

Strong transit access, practical layouts, and neighborhood amenities without premium downtown pricing. These areas appeal to renters who value balance, space, and cost-efficiency over nightlife and being at the center of the action.



## Education & Schools

Public schools **vary by catchment and program**, and families often choose neighborhoods with specific school boundaries in mind. Across the city and nearby suburbs, you'll find strong options plus **specialty tracks** like French Immersion and IB pathways. Private and independent schools are widely available, including well-regarded options on the West Side and the North Shore, with many families **applying early** due to waitlists.



## Day-to-Day Life in Vancouver

- **Transit is legit:** SkyTrain, SeaBus, and buses make it easy to live car-light or car-free in the city.
- **Weather wisdom:** Invest in a great rain jacket, not an umbrella. You'll fit right in.
- **Outdoor access is daily-life level:** Before-work runs on the Seawall and after-dinner

hikes are normal.

- **Food scene strategy:** Follow neighborhoods, not hype. Some of the best meals are in unassuming strip malls.
- **Air conditioning is rare:** Fans and cross-breezes are common, even in newer buildings.

In Vancouver, **sustainability is part of daily life, not just talk.** The city makes it easy to live greener without overthinking it. Public transit, protected bike lanes, and walkable neighborhoods mean many residents skip car ownership altogether. Composting and recycling are standard in most buildings, with clear systems that actually get used. New housing leans toward energy-efficient, and green building standards are widely adopted across the city.



Food culture supports the mission as well. Farmers' markets run year-round, seafood is locally sourced, and seasonal eating is the norm rather than the exception. Add in vast urban parks, protected waterfronts, and **a population that genuinely values environmental responsibility,** and you get a city where sustainability is built into how things work.
